

LEARNING AT HOME YOUNG TODDLER WEEK 1

March 23rd-27th



Dear Families,

We are excited to launch plans for Week 1. There are some great options for physical activities in an indoor environment. Additionally, some simple ideas with materials available at home to support the creative undertakings. We hope you enjoy this week's plan with your little ones!

Language Development

Reading Books

Read Nursery Rhymes with your toddler. Make the stories come to life for them by changing your voice to match the different characters in the story.



Social-Emotional Development

Tea Party

Using kitchen utensils, have a pretend (or real) tea party with your toddler. Talk about manners and how to take turns when pouring the tea.



Physical Literacy

Obstacle Course

Create an obstacle course for you toddler. Encourage your toddler to run, jump and climb over the different obstacles. To create your obstacles you can use hula hoops, string with stakes in the ground, slide, ball and bucket, balance beams (or wood).

Cognitive Development

Sink or Float

Provide your toddler with a bin of water. Give your toddler different toys that they can drop in the water. Talk to your toddler as they are doing the activity about whether the items sink or float.

Creative Activity

Shape Collage

Using construction paper (or felt/foam/tissue paper), make precut shapes that your toddler can glue to the paper. Talk to your toddler about the shapes and colors they are using. This is going to teach your toddler new vocabulary.



Additional Activities

Building: Use recycled materials to build castles with.

Sensory: Make a taste safe play dough with your toddler. Provide your toddler with the playdough and baking tools for them to pretend to make muffins.

Get Outside: Outside, kick a soccer ball around with your toddler or take a walk and point out different things in their environment.

Writing: Provide the children with paper and writing materials to practice their writing skills. This is the beginning of literacy development.
