

LEARNING AT HOME YOUNG TODDLER WEEK 10

May 25th-29th



Dear Families,

We are excited to launch plans for Week 10. There are some great options for physical activities in an indoor environment. Additionally, some simple ideas with materials available at home to support the creative undertakings. We hope you enjoy this week's plan with your little ones!

Language Development

Location Words

When playing with your child use location words to describe where objects are. Use words such as "next to", "on top of", "in front of", "behind", "below", "far apart", "close together" when describing objects. Use these words while you are on a walk to describe things in the environment.



Social-Emotional Development

Emotion Faces Book

Create an emotion faces book using pictures of your child, you, or pictures from a magazine. Find pictures that display the different emotions. Glue them to paper and make them into a boo that your toddler can look at.



Physical Literacy

Farm Animal Yoga

Duck- Place an object between their legs and waddle like a duck.

Pig- Lay on their back with their knees to their chest. Rock from side to side.

Horse- Gallop around the room.

Cow- In a crawling pose, let your toddler moo like a cow.

Sheep- Jump from foot to foot like you are jumping over a fence.

Donkey- In a crawling pose, kick on leg back at a time.

Chicken- Flap your wings like a chicken.

Dog- Downward dog pose.



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Cognitive Development

Egg Color Sorting

Provide your toddler with colored plastic eggs and different color plates (color on paper plates with crayons). Encourage and help your toddler sort the eggs by color. Count how many eggs you have in each color.



Creative Activity

Shredded Paper Sheep

Let your toddler rip up paper to use on their shredded paper sheep. Give them a paper plate and glue for them to use with the shredded paper. Give your toddler materials to make a face and legs to add to their sheep.



Additional Activities

Sensory: Animals in dirt- Add toy animals (farm animals if you have them) to dirt for your child to explore. As they play with the animals, talk about the animal sounds each animals makes. Encourage your toddler to mimic those sounds.

Yarn Collage: Cut up pieces of yarn and give your child paper and glue. Let them glue the yarn on the paper.

Tractor Prints: Let your toddler paint using toy tractors (or toy cars). Bring their attention to the markers the tractor is making on the paper.
