

LEARNING AT HOME YOUNG PRESCHOOLER WEEK 11

Dear Families,

We are excited to launch plans for Week 11. There are some great options for physical activities in an indoor environment. Additionally, some simple ideas with materials available at home to support the creative undertakings. We hope you enjoy this week's plan with your little ones!

Language Development

Letter Identification Tunnels

Make tunnels with letters on them using construction paper that your child can drive their cars through and identify the letter. If you have enough cars, you can write letters on the cars with blue tape and have your child match the letter car to the correct tunnel.



Social-Emotional Development

Emotion Charades

Draw pictures of different emotion faces. Fold the pictures and put them in a bucket. Take turns with your toddler and pick out a paper. Act out that emotion and guess what the other is doing.



Physical Literacy

Mirror, Mirror

Stand with a partner. One of you will start doing a movement and the other will mirror their partner. Try doing different movements waving your arms, jumping walking, wiggling, bending, hopping, spinning.

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Cognitive Development

Number Identification Roads

Provide roads in the shape of a number for your child to drive their toy cars on. While your child is playing, help them identify the number. You can use construction paper, tape or felt to make your number roads.



Creative Activity

Boat Creations

Make a boat out of recycled materials. Test your boat creations out in water to see if they float. Recycled Material ideas: juice carton, cereal box, milk carton, tissue box, or cardboard.



Additional Activities

Car Wash: Provide a small amount of shaving cream in a sensory table with toy cars, tooth brushes, water and small spray bottles. If you do not have extra toothbrushes, you can use wash clothes or sponges.

Who can fly farther?: Test different paper airplane designs to see which flies better.

Dramatic Play: Set up a pretend train station for your child to pretend that they are traveling. Make a train out of a cardboard box and let your child use a suitcase for their pretend travels.
