January 25th- January 29th




Dear Families,

We are excited to launch plans for Week 9. There are some great options for physical activities in an indoor environment. Additionally, some simple ideas with materials available at home to support the creative undertakings. We hope you enjoy this week's plan with your little ones!

Language Development

Snowman Building


Show your child a picture of a snowman. Ask them what they will need to make a snowman (snow, hat, sticks, buttons or coal, carrot, scarf). If there is snow outside, go outside and build a snowman together using all the items your child wants to include.



Social-Emotional Development

Snow Cones

Make pretend snow cones with your child using snow (or crushed ice). Add the snow to a bin with a muffin tin and an ice cream scoop. Let them scoop the snow and fill the muffin tin. Work together as a team to fill the muffin tin.



Physical Literacy

Snowflake Moves

Have the children act like snowflakes. Pretend to be snowflakes falling gently from the sky or moving fast like a blizzard.

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Cognitive Development

Colored Snowball Sorting

Provide the children with colored snowballs (pom poms or crumbled paper). Have your child sort the snowballs by color and talk about the colors that they are sorting.

Creative Activity

Driving in the Snow

Provide the children with white paint, colored paper and cars. Let your child dip their car in the white paint and drive the car on their paper leaving the paint marks behind.



Additional Activities

Weather Observations: Provide your child with paper and writing materials. Have your child observe and document the weather.

Snowball Playdough: Make snow playdough with your child. Let your child roll the playdough and make snowballs. Have them make as many snowballs as they can and count the amount of snowflakes they can make.

Oobleck: Mix cornstarch and water to make oobleck. Let your child explore with the oobleck using additional toys.
